Profile

The Foundation for the People of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield in Illinois is a **not-for-profit corporation** of the State of Illinois, legally separate from the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois. It was incorporated on October 14, 1992. Its purposes are to further the ministries of and to receive funds for the religious, charitable, educational and social purposes of the diocese within the meaning of section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

In practice, the Foundation manages **endowed monies** on behalf of parishes, parish schools, diocesan entities and purposes.

The members of the **Board of Directors** of the Foundation are diocesan officials: the diocesan bishop (president), the vicar general/moderator of the curia (vice-president), the diocesan finance officer (treasurer), the director of the Office for Development (secretary) and the superintendent of Catholic schools (member).

The bylaws of the Foundation require that the president of the board of directors appoint an advisory board to offer advice on any matter handled by the Foundation. Each member of the advisory board serves for a three-year term, which is renewable. The Foundation is required to meet annually, though in practice it meets more frequently.

Criteria, Policies and Guidelines

Following are the criteria and guidelines governing participation in the Foundation:

- Any diocesan entity may establish an endowment in the *Foundation for the People of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield in Illinois* with a contribution of \$1,000 or more.
- ☑ Donors may add any amount to an existing endowment within the Foundation at any time throughout the year.
- ☐ The beneficiaries of the Foundation shall be the parishes and parish schools of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield in Illinois and those diocesan entities or purposes specifically designated as the beneficiaries of the Foundation by the diocesan bishop (e.g., the formation of seminarians, the continued formation of priests, the health care of priests, the pensions of priests, etc.).
- The "representatives" for any execution of forms or for any decisions to be made by beneficiaries shall be the pastors (or their equivalents in canon law) of the parishes and parish schools which are beneficiaries, and the diocesan bishop of the diocesan entities and purposes which are beneficiaries.

☑ Each beneficiary shall have a local advisory board whose bylaws are approved by the Board of Directors. This advisory board will advise the representatives of the beneficiary

on the disbursement of earnings. Parishes may choose to select an existing group to fulfill this role.

Distributions from the Foundation are made annually. Beneficiaries have the option of taking full payment of any earnings, reinvesting those earnings, placing those funds in a deferred account for later disbursal or any combination of the above.

☐ The Foundation is audited once a year in accordance with standard accounting practices.

Increased Vocations to the Priesthood

In the past few years the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois has been blessed with an increase in vocations to the priesthood. In fact, since 2010 our average number of seminarians has more than doubled. This is a wonderful situation to be in, but with increased vocations come increased expenses. Our goal is to have even more seminarians in a few years making financial planning to cover the expected expenses more crucial than ever before.

Currently our seminarians attend a variety of schools: Bishop Simon Bruté Seminary, Indianapolis, IN.; Mundelein, Mundelein, II.; Kenrick-Glennon, St. Louis, MO.; St. Meinrad, St. Meinrad, IN.; Sacred Heart Seminary, Hales Corners, WI.; and the Pontifical North American College in Rome. Expenses vary at each school, but the average cost is \$45,000 per year per seminarian. Most years our seminarian expenses comprise about 25% of the annual budget for the diocese.

How does all this tie in with the Foundation for the People of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield in Illinois? For years a small portion of our vocations budget has been covered by distributions from endowments. Bishop Thomas John Paprocki is planning a major effort to cover most or all of our seminarian expenses using income from endowments in the Foundation.

Other dioceses have conducted similar campaigns to fund seminarian endowments and have been very successful. Early indications show that we should experience similar success in our diocese.

Please consider supporting our seminarians' education effort for the generations to come.

Bequests may be cash or property. Provisions for gifts to the Foundation from an estate may be for a specified amount or a percentage of the remainder after all other bequests and obligations have been satisfied.

Life insurance gifts can be made naming the Foundation for the People of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield in Illinois as beneficiary.

Retirement plans are valuable gifts to consider. By naming the Foundation as beneficiary of these assets, one can avoid taxation and possibly pass on larger estates to loved ones.
